Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

April is a month of rejoicing, as we begin celebrating the 50 days of the Easter season. The disciples had to figure out how to continue the Jesus movement without Jesus being physically present with them on a day-to-day basis. We are in that boat as well. We are free to go in any direction we wish in our faith. How we

shall be a community is up to us.

One of the joys that we have as Episcopalians is a very wide variety of study material that we can use, to show us different directions that are open to us. The Episcopal Church doesn't make us march in lock step and demand we adhere to this doctrine or that understanding. When I was in seminary, I was totally surprised that most of the theology we studied was not written by Anglicans! We read and discussed J.D.Crossan, a Roman Catholic and D. Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran. John Macquarrie's Principles of Christian Theology, was the only modern Anglican theologian we read. We used R. Niebuhr, from the Reformed tradition and Alexander Schmemann to help us understand how the Orthodox were thinking. My point is that there is not a "definitive" understanding which tells us how to move forward in the resurrection as a community of Episcopalians. Our perspective of how we live out the faith has to be constructed from our own experience and understanding.

We have the Book of Common Prayer that forms some basis for life together, yet when you look at how the Prayer Book changed from the "Protestant" 1928 BCP to the "Anglo-Catholic" 1979 BCP, we are still left with a variety of "looks" to choose from. So the question is now, , "Who is God calling us to become?" In this Post-Covid time of incredible change in the Church and the rapidly changing world around us, Easter is a season that points us to live out the faith in a way that makes sense to us and the world around us at this time and in this particular place. The Easter Season calls us to be a community of the resurrected Christ, with openness and innovation.



Happy Eastertide to you all! You may also refer to this season as Paschaltide, Easter Season, Paschal Season, Paschal Time, or Easter Time. So many wonderful choices to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Lord¹!

Easter, and the entirety of its season, allow for such

celebratory and joyful music. It gives our faith foundation an exciting and fulfilling sense of stalwartness and peace. I have learned quite a bit about this season recently, including the many reasons that Eastertide is 50 days. Whether we look at the literal translation of Pentecost, or count the days that Jesus spent on earth after his resurrection and then ten days between his ascension and the celebration of Pentecost, we see the number fifty throughout our faith².

On **Friday, April 19, 2024, 7:00 pm** at Trinity Memorial Church, 44 Main Street, Binghamton, NY, acclaimed organist Randall Steere will offer his *Concert for the Future*.

The *Concert for the Future* was developed by the artist, Randy Steere, to reflect his vision for the future of organ music. It will form the basis for a discussion on this important topic being held at Trinity Memorial Church on Saturday, April 20 at 10:00 AM.

Sponsored by the local chapter of the American Guild of Organists, the session will feature Randy's articulation of his vision for the future of the organ as well as reaction and input from all in attendance. All are encouraged to attend (especially if you are NOT an organist or a member of the AGO!). Your input will be very valuable as Randy facilitates a discussion pertinent to all area churches and music lovers.

The concert itself comprises a very diverse set of more contemporary composers to appeal both to a wider audience not familiar with organ music as well as the organ aficionado. New arrangements of "Amazing Grace" and "Kum Ba Yah" will be performed alongside meditative pieces from around the world, a rousing Toccata and even a fresh Wedding March! Just over an hour long, it will be an exciting concert to engage the audience on many levels!

Acclaimed for his solo appearances throughout New England, Randy Steere has served as Assistant Organist at Old South Church. A New England native, he received his B.M. degree from Barrington College (student of Alan Brown), an M.M. from Yale School of Music and Institute of Sacred Music (student of Robert Baker), an M.Div. from Yale Divinity School, and a Master's of Computer Science from RPI.

After graduating from Yale, he became the full-time Minister of Music at the First Church of Christ, Congregational, Glastonbury (CT) for 9 years where he developed an expansive ministry, including two large adult choirs, two handbell choirs, a children's choir, two concert series, young singles ministry, and weekly commercial TV and radio broadcasts. Under Randy's initiative, the church hosted the East Branch of the Hartford Camerata School of Music, where he also taught organ and choral conducting. Additionally, he taught organ performance, handbells, and church music classes at Barrington College (now Gordon College).

Following his career in music, Randy switched to computers and became an IT Director at a mid-sized law firm for 7 years before running his own consulting and software company for 20 years. In 2020, he fully retired to become more actively involved in the music world once again, taking several study trips to Europe, working for a pipe organ builder, and concertizing widely on the East Coast. Randy has served on the Board of the Hartford Chapter AGO and was on the Board of Trustees for Arioso, a string ensemble of Hartford Symphony players where he was responsible for grant applications. He is currently Treasurer of the Merrimack AGO Chapter, a Trustee of the Methuen, MA, Memorial Music Hall and actively involved in the Groton Hill, MA, School of Music.
