Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Do we live our lives differently inside the church compared to how we live our lives outside of church? The classic example is a mafia "don" going to Mass and acting as a "faithful" Roman Catholic yet still having people killed and leading numerous criminal enterprises. It is a stunning dichotomy when the message of Christianity does not translate into action in a

person's life. There are many other examples of this happening in less obvious ways in the world around us.

What masquerades as "Christianity" often does not even resemble what Jesus and the Apostles taught about, namely, reconciling the world to a God of love. I will freely admit, it is a constant struggle to stay true to our Baptismal vows as the world in which we live pulls at us to act in a way contrary to our Christian beliefs. How do you follow the Prince of Peace yet advocate the violent overthrow of another religious or ethnic group? If Jesus taught "render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and to God that which is God's" how can Christian Nationalism even use the name "Christian"?

I pray that as followers of Jesus, we may live out our belief that God is loving, forgiving and faithful to us by making every effort to be merciful and caring to others. The Invitatory Psalm we know as the *Jubilate* begins: *O be joyful in the Lord all ye lands, serve the Lord with gladness and come before God's presence with a song!* When we know the grace and love of God, how can we keep from singing out in joy.

I hope everyone is enjoying the community building activities that we have been doing using the graffiti boards. I hope there were a few surprises as we found out how our brothers and sisters came to Trinity. I hope we found commonality with our experience as people

Madrigal Choir of Binghamton Concert October 27




October 27, 4:00 pm; Trinity Memorial

Music Notes



To my dear friends in Christ,

I cannot believe that Thanksgiving is almost here! This fall has been a very busy season, and the choir and handbell choir have been working hard to prepare music for our Sunday morning services!

As the choir is preparing a large new work by Mårten Jansson titled *Requiem Novum*, we have had time to reflect and dig into this musical treasure! This piece features our choir and soprano soloist, Christina Taylor, as well as many local musicians who will be playing in the chamber ensemble. VOCES8, a professional vocal ensemble, premiered this piece on a new recording released in March of 2023. They had the following to say about this wonderful new composition.

"This new large work for chorus and orchestra, written by Swedish composer Mårten Jansson and American lyricist Charles Anthony Silvestri, features the familiar movements of the Latin Requiem Mass, with new poetry in response to each movement, but from the perspective of the dead. The entire work moves from the somber, melancholy, even fearful tones of the mass movements to responses of hope and wonder, as those whom we mourn reveal the peace, redemption, and sheer wonder of their new reality beyond the veil of eternity. Requiem Novum expresses the grief we feel, our hope for life eternal, and provides an opportunity for those we have lost to comfort us."¹

This musical offering will be presented on Sunday, November 3rd at 4 PM in the sanctuary.

Many famous composers have written Requiems. Some do it as a part of their larger output, some do it as a way to process through their own grief, and some compose because they have been commissioned to. A requiem is defined by dictionary.com as...

1: a mass for the dead,

2a: a solemn chant (such as a dirge) for the repose of the dead,

2b: something that resembles such a solemn chant,

3a: a musical setting of the mass for the dead,

3b: a musical composition in honor of the dead.²

As we all navigate the world of life and death, my prayer is that you will find grace, hope, and love as we process this new work and the myriad feelings and experiences throughout life and death.

During Advent there will be a Sunday of an extended prelude featuring solo piano music focusing on advent hymns and carols! We will then culminate the Fall/Christmas season with Benjamin Britten's *Ceremony of Carols* at the traditional 10:30 PM Christmas Eve service.

kwpk Being a good Christian is hard - harder than it, perhaps, should be. It's hard, because, if we're honest, knowing what it means to be a follower of Christ is like looking through a kaleidoscope. This is, of course, wonder-ful, as it reflects the incomprehensible richness of God as expressed in each of us. It also should give us pause.

Diversity in our understanding of our faith in Christ and his teachings is nothing new. The apostles were not uniform in their understanding of what they were taught and experienced. Neither were the early Christian communities, as we can deduce, for example, from St. Paul's writings.

Matters, of course, didn't just stop with different understandings of Jesus' nature, teachings, and commission to His followers. "The State" - in the form of Roman emperor Constantine I. - had to meddle, by calling several councils - the first one in the first half of the 310s A. D. in Arles, and the for us very consequential one in the 320s A.D. in Nicea in modern-day Turkey. We don't even need to ask, whether either one of those efforts resulted in a single, common understanding - how could it? Each unique reflection of Jesus' life and teaching was genuinely and strongly heart-felt. How could any one's reflection be possibly not right, even when it was contradicted by some other person's equally heart-felt reflection?

Worldly powers' meddling in Christian faith took another step into the abyss of entanglement of religion and state, when Christianity was declared the official State Religion of the Roman Empire - not just one of many religions tolerated in the Roman Empire, but the official religion of the Empire itself.

The history of entanglement between Christianity and the state since then can at best be described as a mainly sordid one, with only occasional glimpses of light. Armed conflicts, sentiments of superiority, doctrine of discovery, forced conversions, brutal killing of other-minded Christians as heretics - I can't think of a crime against humans that has not been perpetrated in the name of Christian faith.

If we reflect on that history, it becomes clearer why the separation of religion and state was not just a nice idea, but one that is fundamental to religious liberty as an integral part of the American project: it removed the state and its power of legislation and (en)force(ment) as the deciding party for religious differences - not just between Christians, Muslims, Jews, Hindus and many other expressions of a life in faith, but perhaps even more importantly between different readings, experiences, and expressions of Christian faith.

Upholding that freedom and preserving it for future generations has been, and will continue to be, a life-long challenge for all of us. It includes respect, if not outright love, for anyone disagreeing with our own personal reflection of what it means to be a Christian. It also includes the justifiable expectation that anyone disagreeing with our reflection would respect, if not outright love, us.

After two thousand years of mainly failed entanglement of state and religion, we really should allow ourselves not to feel self-righteous about what we see as our faith - rather, we should be humbled by the many experiences of our faith; we should support each other in deepening our understanding of what it means to be a Christian - by sharing, listening, empathizing - so that by building on the love of Christ for all of us we may spread His love, and by doing so be known as His followers. For that, we don't need the state's power of policy and enforcement - if anything, entangling faith with power gets into the way of love. Openness, if not simply surrender, to Jesus' unconditional love for us, and our willingness to extend it to all around us in turn, is all we need. I told you it would be hard.
